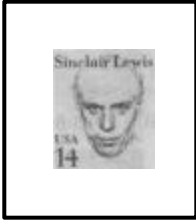


Great Americans Issue



Sinclair Lewis (1885-1951)

Released: 3/21/85

Scott: 1856

Author of novels that attacked weakness in American Society. First American to win a Nobel Prize for literature.



Rachel Carson (1907-1964)

Released: 5/26/81

Scott: 1857

An American Marine Biologist and Science Writer. She wrote about the interrelations of all living things.



George Mason (1725-1792)

Released: 5/28/81

Scott: 1858

Wrote the first Bill of Rights. Jefferson used this document to write the Declaration of Independence.



Sequoyah (1755-1843)

Released: 12/27/80

Scott: 1859

Cherokee Indian. He is best known for writing the Cherokee language. The Sequoia tree is named after him.



Ralph Bunche (1904-1971)

Released: 1/12/82

Scott: 1860

Laid the groundwork for the United Nations. Appointed to the UN Palestine Commission in 47. Nobel prize winner.

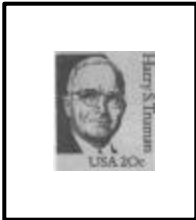


Thomas H. Gallaudet (1787-1851)

Released: 6/10/83

Scott: 1861

Pioneered education for deaf people in the U.S. Used the French sign language method over English oral method.

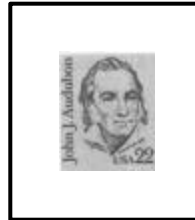


Harry S. Truman (1884-1972)

Released: 1/26/84

Scott: 1862

Defeated Japan in WWII. After the war, he created peacetime programs such as NATO and the Marshall plan.

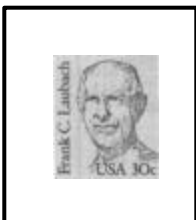


John J. Audubon (1785-1851)

Released: 4/23/85

Scott: 1863

Studied and painted birds of North America. The Audubon Society was named after him, which studies birds.

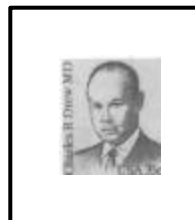


Frank C. Laubach (1884-1970)

Released: 9/2/84

Scott: 1864

Won fame by teaching illiterate people how to read. His system used phonetics to symbols to represent phonetic sounds.



Charles R. Drew, MD (1904-1950)

Released: 6/3/81

Scott: 1865

Researched blood plasma. During WWII, he saved millions of lives by establishing blood banks with plasma.



Robert Millikan (1868-1953)

Released: 1/26/82

Scott: 1866

American Physicist. He is noted by the electrical charge carried by the electron and experiments with cosmic rays.



Grenville Clark (1882-1967)

Released: 3/20/85

Scott: 1867

'Statesman Incognito'. Humanitarian who's work spanned through WWI, WWII.
