Lillian M. Gilbreth (1878-1972)

Released: 2/24/84

Scott: 1868

1915 Brown Phd. Graduate. Industrial Engineer that studied time management. Wrote '*Fatigue Study*' in 1916.



Chester W. Nimitz (1885-1966)

Released: 2/22/85

Scott: 1869

Commander in chief of the Pacific Navy during WWII. He led the U.S. to many victories, driving the Japanese back.



Margaret Mitchell (1900-1944)

Released: 6/30/85

Scott: 2168

American Author who wrote '*Gone With The Wind*'. It is a story about the South during the Civil War.



Mary Lyon (1797-1849)

Released: 2/28/87

Scott: 2169

Founded Mt. Holyoke College. Believed through educational opportunities, women developed talents to help others.



Paul Dudley White, MD (1186-1973)

Released: 9/15/85

Scott: 2170

Worlds most respected authority on heart disease. President of American Heart Association. Served under Eisenhower.



Father Flanagan (1886-1948)

Released: 7/14/85

Scott: 2171

A Catholic Priest who founded Boys Town in Omaha NE in 1917, a private shelter for homeless and abused kids.



Hugo L. Black (1886-1971)

Released: 2/27/85

Scott: 2172

Justice of the Supreme Court of the U.S. from 1937 to 1971. He became know for defending right of free speech.



Luis Munoz Marin ()

Released: 2/18/90

Scott: 2173

Elected Governor of Puerto Rico in 1948. His popular Democratic Party favored a Commonwealth linked to U.S.



Red Cloud (1822-1909)

Released: 2175

Scott: 8/15/87

A great warrior of Oglala. Tried to keep White Settlers out of Montana, South Dakota, and Wyoming in the 1860's.



Julia Ward Howe (1819-1910)

Released: 2/12/87

Scott: 2176

She introduced 'Mothers Day'. She was an American lecturer, writer, and reformer.



Buffalo Bill Cody (1846-1917)

Released: 6/6/88

Scott: 2177

He became known for his marksmanship. He later became a showman, appearing in several plays.



Belva Ann Lockwood (1830-1917)

Released: 6/18/88

Scott: 2176

Won equal pay for women gov't workers. 1st woman lawyer to practice before the Supreme Court.
